Water tasted bad??

After the last maintenance at the water treatment plant the water took on a bad flavour due to dissolved minerals. Some reported a stronger chlorine taste but those levels usually stay at the same level. Samples are taken constantly and the water supply has always maintained a safe status and the disagreeable taste is almost gone now. It is a good policy to occasionally flush your water heater, so this may be the ideal time to do so. Sorry for any inconvenience during this recovery time.

One of the fortunate outcomes of this has been the staff has found leaks in our system and repaired them and now the water treatment plant is running at a very efficient capacity.

laser show and lights at 210 Albert Street, flashing brilliance seen at 218 William and magnificent reds at the corner of Richard and many other addresses.

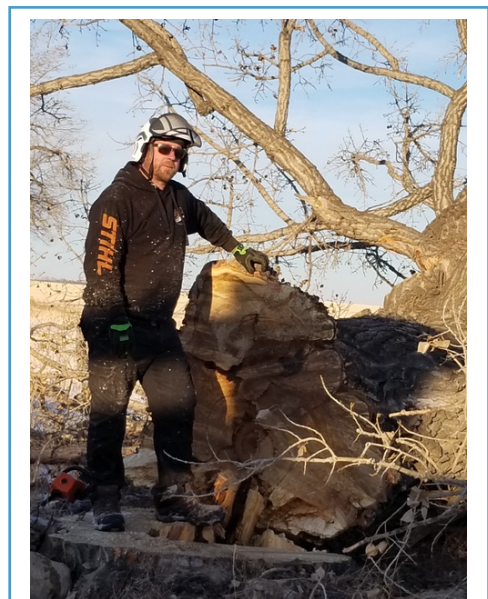

Making Manitou Home

Coming from England we immigrated to Canada on the Saskatchewan Nominee Program. Jeff is a very experienced Heavy Goods Vehicle driver with some 45+ years following those white lines throughout England and Europe. Canada had been calling for a number of years and after a short tour of the country late in 2006 we finally made the decision to try it for a couple of years as we didn't want to live with if's and but's later in life.

Our Canadian experience was achieved by working in Canada for about a year on a valid temporary resident permit. Although it all sounds pretty straightforward it was quite scary; leaving our country of residence, uprooting and leaving family behind was a major leap of faith for temporary status in Canada, with no guarantee of permanent residence. Now some 14 years later we can honestly say we have no regrets and in 2015 we finally became Canadian Citizens.

There are lots of little 'English' things we miss though, fish 'n' chips, proper cream – whipping cream just doesn't do it, gravy granules, bacon, ham, sausages- all too heavily smoked for our palettes and chocolate – believe me it's so very different.

We lived in Saskatoon when we first came over but after a couple of years the chance to own a property at Manitou Beach came up. We loved our weekend trips and the Sunday drive back to the city always came too quickly. It sounds odd to say, but even with all the renovations that have taken so much of our time, we have always been able to relax here. Eventually we made the move and have now lived in this community for around 6 years.

How is it like England? Well you all speak English so that helps, we didn't have to learn a different language. We've learned to love a good salad, it was odd at first to have a cold salad served with a hot meal. So much space, we both feel we can breathe here. Anyone who has ever travelled to Europe will know how congested it is. Even food shopping entails fighting to see the items on shelves and vast queues for checkout.

We consider ourselves very fortunate; we have visited lots of different countries, experiencing many different cultures, from Europe to Malaysia to New Zealand but choose to live here and that says a lot to us. Liz & Jeff

Remember When... Manitou Beach

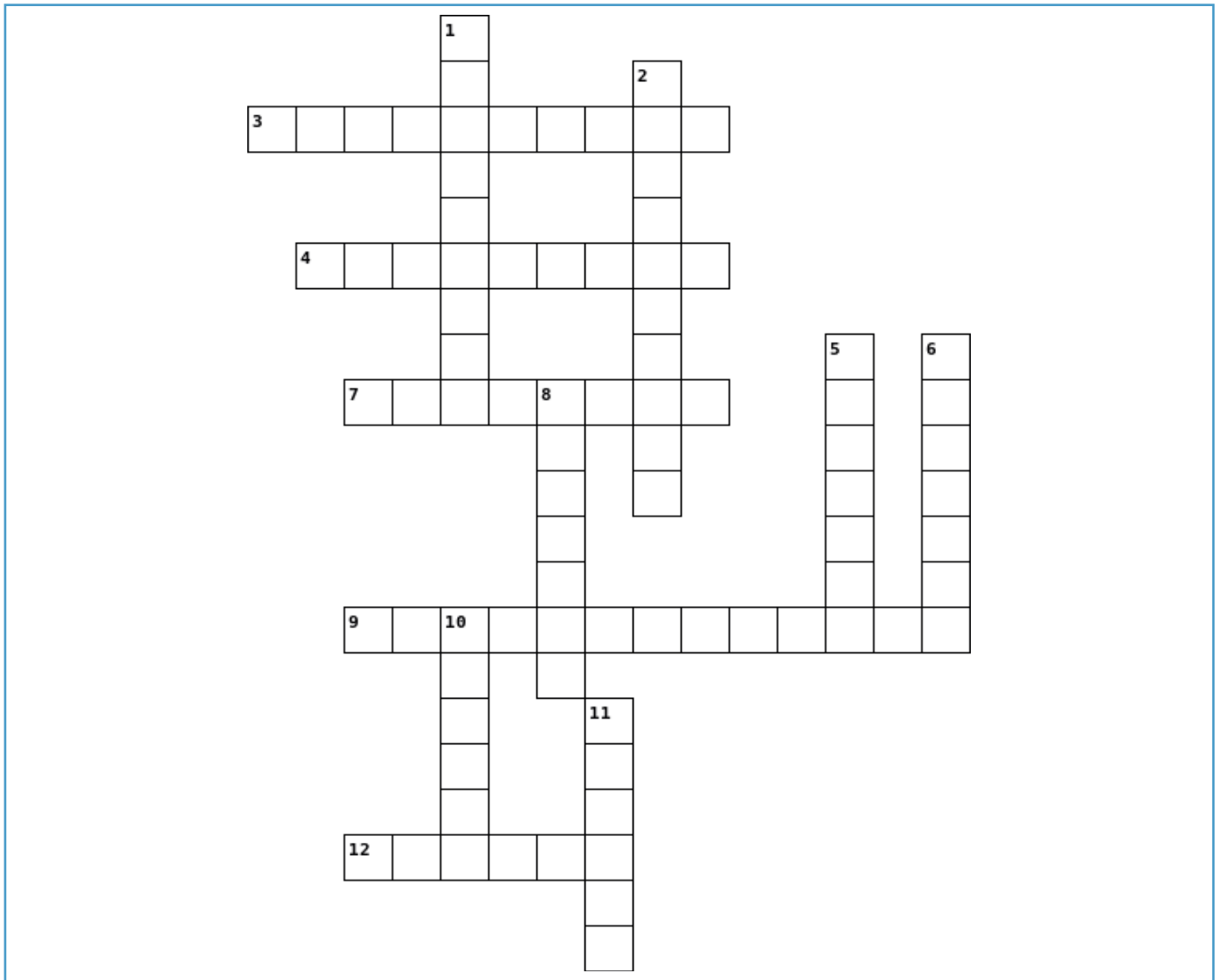
My connection to Manitou Beach has been pretty much lifelong. My first memory is being taken to swim in the Chalet Pool when I was five. I went with my friends from Ontario accompanied by their grandparents who ran the hardware store in Watrous. Like a lot of Watrous people at the time, they had a seasonal cabin at the Beach. A little old one, painted pink called the EEEE. I have a picture taken with them and other “beach kids” (kids whose parents grew up in the area and came to stay each summer) in the back yard of that cabin in 1958. During the summer of 1970, I stayed at that cabin together with some friends for a few days and enjoyed some time free from parents! It was that summer the Canadian based band Mashmakhan played at Danceland. The Friday night dances at Danceland were the social highlight of the summers.

Growing up I spent hours in the Pool or on the beach and in the lake. A Sunday night barbeque at our own cabin on William Street with family and friends was routine. Running down to Wragg’s Store for 5 cent popsicles from my friends’ Grandma’s on Albert Street. Being a camper and then counsellor at the United Church Camp on John Street. Climbing the hill and class wiener roasts in Wellington Park were mandatory! So were dips in the lake after hot afternoons pulling weeds at the farm then rinsing off under the gravity showers that were at every beach. Our dog also liked the Beach and would travel 5 miles from our farm down to the Burger Buoy to beg for treats. Winter saw many of us tobogganing down the hill by the tennis courts.

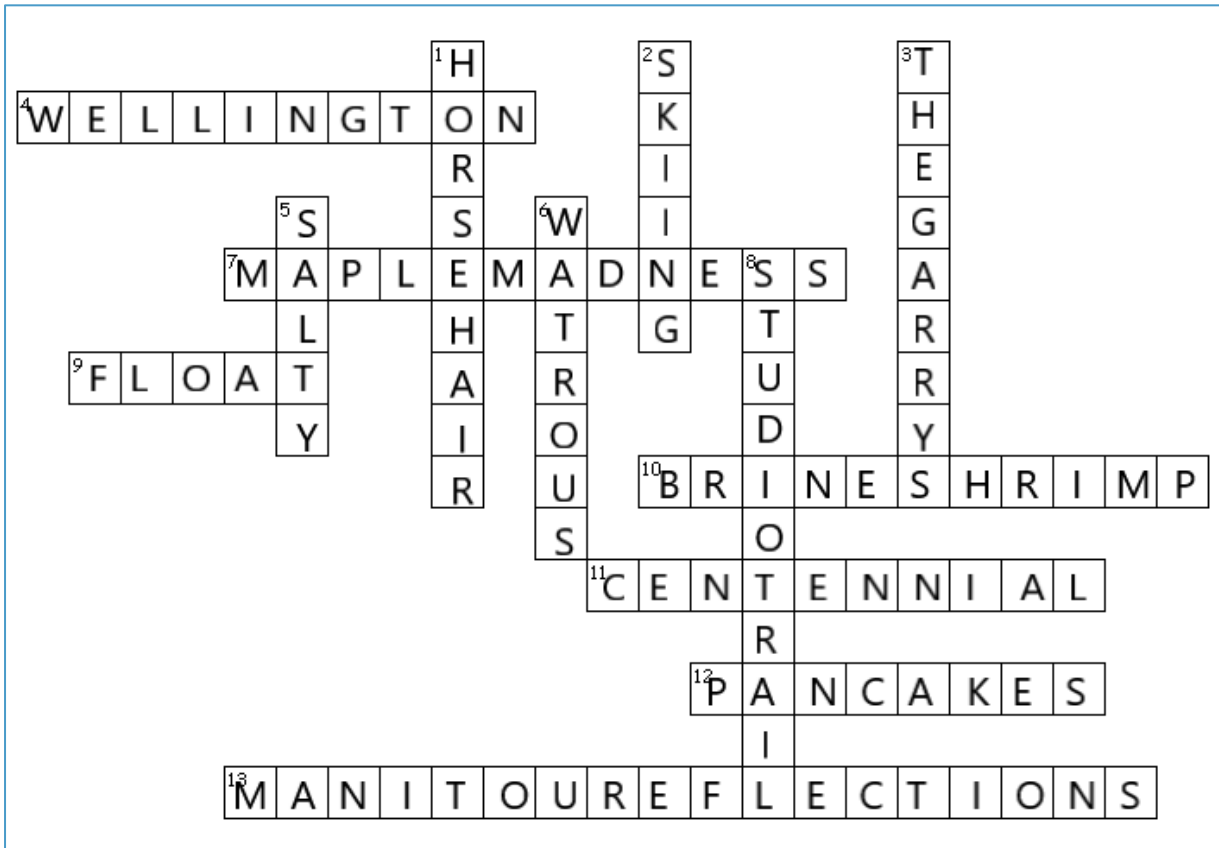

Today, I have my own cabin and have introduced my nephew’s family to Danceland Toonie Tuesdays, to swimming in the lake, to going for ice cream and to searching for fairies in Wellington. 
